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SPOTTING DEMENTIA EARLY: KWSH AND SUSS ROLL OUT WHO SCREENING TO EMPOWER SENIORS IN THE HEARTLANDS

In a proactive step to support seniors in the community, **Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital (KWSH)** is collaborating with the **Singapore University of Social Sciences (SUSS)** to roll out the **Integrated Care for Older People (ICOPE)** Community Screening across two of its Community Care Centres from **21 to 25 April 2025**. This initiative empowers seniors aged 60 and above to proactively detect early signs of functional decline —particularly in cognitive health.

- 2 Developed by the **World Health Organisation**, the ICOPE screening tool is a simple, nine-item questionnaire designed to assess six domains of intrinsic capacity: cognition, locomotor function, vitality, vision, hearing, and psychological health. The results help identify early signs of capacity loss, including potential dementia, and allow for timely intervention.
- The ICOPE screening is conducted by trained assessors from **SUSS**, whose programme is supported by **Ngee Ann Kongsi**. Beyond screening, a **research study** by **SUSS**, **Hong Kong Polytechnic University and KWSH** will explore the prevalence of intrinsic capacity decline and map care pathways for seniors in Singapore.
- 4 The screening sessions will take place at KWSH's Community Care Centres at St George and McNair, with a target of screening over 300 seniors residing in or near the catchment area.
- 5 Each participating senior will receive:
 - A personalised care plan with achievable goals in areas such as nutrition, mobility, mental well-being, and cognitive stimulation.
 - A community resource directory for relevant services such as hearing tests and primary care clinics.
 - Counselling and guidance on maintaining or improving their intrinsic capacity.
- 6 Those requiring medical follow-up will be referred to healthcare professionals for diagnosis and further care. Seniors will also be encouraged to return for a follow-up screening in six months.
- The initiative reflects **KWSH's commitment to upstream senior care** and supports the national **Age Well SG** campaign, which encourages seniors to age confidently through preventive care and community support. "Through this initiative, it allows us to detect early signs of functional decline, including cognitive issues, and intervene before conditions worsen," said **Dr Mok Ying Jang, CEO of Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital**. "By bringing this to the heartlands, we make preventive care more accessible and empower older adults to age confidently in their own communities." **Assoc Prof Carol Ma, Head of Gerontology Programmes and Senior Fellow, Centre for Experiential Learning, SUSS**, added: "We're excited to partner with Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital and the WHO Collaborating Centre for

Community Health Services on this important pilot. Since 2022, we've trained over 120 assessors, including professionals, caregivers, and seniors, to identify early signs of decline and promote healthy ageing. This initiative allows us to implement focused education and interventions, helping seniors remain active and supported within their communities."

Kwong Wai Shiu Hospital (KWSH) is a 115-year-old charitable healthcare organisation and is registered as an Institution of Public Character, committed to looking after the sick and needy. With the official opening of its second nursing home in October 2022, KWSH is now one of the largest nursing home operators with close to 1,200 beds as well as expansion in its other services.
